

2020 Derecho CDBG-DR Proposed Public Action Plan

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Purpose For Today's Public Hearing

- The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has allocated \$57,566,000 in Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CBG-DR) funds.
- » Today's public hearing will provide residents impacted by the 2020 Derecho an opportunity to:
 - Ask questions about the goals of the CDBG-DR funding.
 - Understand the proposed programs and budget amounts.
 - Provide comments regarding the Draft Public Action Plan and proposed programs.
- » An opportunity to ask questions and provide comments will follow this presentation.
 - Comments will be accepted both orally and in writing.

2020 CDBG-DR Grant Breakdown

- Allocation: \$57,566,000
- MID Areas: At least 80% of funds must be used in the HUD most impacted and distressed (MID) areas.
- Mitigation Set-Aside: additional amount of 15% for mitigation activities that increase resilience to disasters and reduce long-term risk
- National Objective: at least 70% of the funds must be spent on activities benefiting LMI residents and areas
- Grant Duration: IEDA has 6 years to expend the funds from when HUD signs its grant agreement with Iowa
- Public Action Plan Objective: Use the funding for new construction of affordable housing, rehabilitation, tree planting, and public facility improvements

MID Areas and Mitigation Set-Aside

- 80% of funds (\$46,052,700) must be spent in HUD-MID Areas (Linn County)
- <u>20% of funds (\$11,513,200)</u> must be spent in State-MID Areas (<u>Marshall</u>, <u>Tama</u>, <u>& Benton</u> counties)
- 15% of funds (\$7,508,653) must be spent on mitigation set-aside activities for future natural disasters



National Objective

70% of funds:

- » Must benefit persons of Low-Moderate Income (LMI) households or areas at or below 80% Area Median Income
 - To qualify as an LMI household the total household income would need to be at or below the threshold for 2022 (refer to chart).
- The remaining 30% of CDBG-DR funds can be used for Urgent Need (UN)
 - for those persons/areas that are over the 80% AMI income levels.

Housing – Rental & Owner-Occupied Developer Incentives \$47,187,700

- Funds the construction of **new affordable and resilient** single-family houses and multifamily buildings.
- Competitive applications to IEDA through local municipality (City, County, and Tribes). Applications will be scored and ranked.
- For owner-occupied housing units, the incentive is \$100,000 per any development project, located in eligible areas. All sold units can also utilize a CDBG-DR down-payment assistance.
- For multifamily rental housing, the incentive is \$75,000 per rental housing unit located in eligible areas. All rental units are subject to HUD's 65% HOME rent limits for the LMI tenants for the term of affordability
- All units must have access and connection to municipal utilities including water and sewer, no projects dependent on wells and/or septic systems will be eligible. Up to \$70,000 will be awarded for infrastructure needs per housing unit.

Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation \$2,500,000

- Funds the repair of homes impacted by the 2020 Derecho and still needing assistance to address deficiencies.
- Municipalities will apply for properties to receive nonsubstantial rehabilitation assistance.
- Homeowners cannot receive more assistance than exceeds
 50% of their home's pre-disaster market value
- Homeowners can be either low-to-moderate income (LMI) or over-income (Urgent Need)
- Non-substantial rehabs will need to comply with the HUD CPD Green Building Retrofit Checklist, compliance will be managed through the Iowa Green Streets program.
- Affordability period of 5 years for less than \$15,000 in rehab:
 10 years for \$15,000-40,000.
- Assistance not exceeding \$24,999 per property

Tree Canopy and Tree Replanting Program \$3,000,000

- Funds will assist with the removal of tree stumps and promote replanting activities.
- Trees will be removed or replanted only on public property or the public right of way.
- Estimating an average \$600 per tree planted in eligible areas.
- Restricted to Linn County for the first year.
- The entire assistance will be treated as mitigation that serves to protect the natural areas and prevent future storm flooding

Generators for Critical Facilities \$1,500,000

- Funds the installation of generators that are fixed to nongovernmental buildings (fire dept., community centers, shelters, schools, etc.)
- Communities have indicated the need for a solution to the prolonged power outage from the derecho and lack of accessible power sources.
- Estimating \$50,000 per generator installed.
- Generators will allow critical public facilities to stay open and operating while providing services to the community, such as climate controlled shelter, phone charging, food refrigeration, medical prescription storage, etc.
